# EXPLANATION OF TERMS

## EXPLANATION OF TERMS

**ACADEMIC YEAR** is the year that begins with the first summer session and continues through the next spring session; for example, Academic Year 1999-2000 refers to Summer 1999, Fall 1999, and Spring 2000.

**FALL SESSION**, in this document, is identified by the calendar year in which the session falls; that is, Fall 1999 is in the Academic Year 1999-2000.

**COHORT** refers to a specific population which is studied over a period of time, such as a group of students who enrolled for the first time in the Fall of 1993.

**FULL-TIME UNDERGRADUATE STUDENT** is one who is enrolled in 12 or more semester credit hours.

**FULL-TIME GRADUATE STUDENT** is one who is enrolled in 9 or more semester credit hours.

**PART-TIME UNDERGRADUATE STUDENT** is one who is enrolled in less than 12 semester credit hours.

**PART-TIME GRADUATE STUDENT** is one who is enrolled in less than 9 semester credit hours.

**NON-TRADITIONAL STUDENT** refers to an undergraduate student who is age 25 and over.

**HEADCOUNT** is the actual number of different individuals enrolled in credit courses.

**UNDERGRADUATE "FTE"** (full-time equivalent) is calculated by dividing total undergraduate semester credit hours by 15.

**GRADUATE "FTE"** (full-time equivalent) is calculated by dividing total graduate semester credit hours by 12.

**IHL** refers to the Board of Trustees of State Institutions of Higher Learning in Mississippi.

**IPEDS** is the Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System.

**SREB** (Southern Regional Education Board) States include Alabama, Arkansas, Delaware, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Louisiana, Mississippi, Maryland, North Carolina, Oklahoma, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas, Virginia, and West Virginia.

**TOTAL OPERATING BUDGET** includes restricted, designated and auxiliary funding.

**RANKED FACULTY** are full-time faculty positions including instructors, associate professors, assistant professors, and professors.

**UNRANKED FACULTY** are full-time faculty positions filled by lecturers who do not have tenure and cannot seek rank.

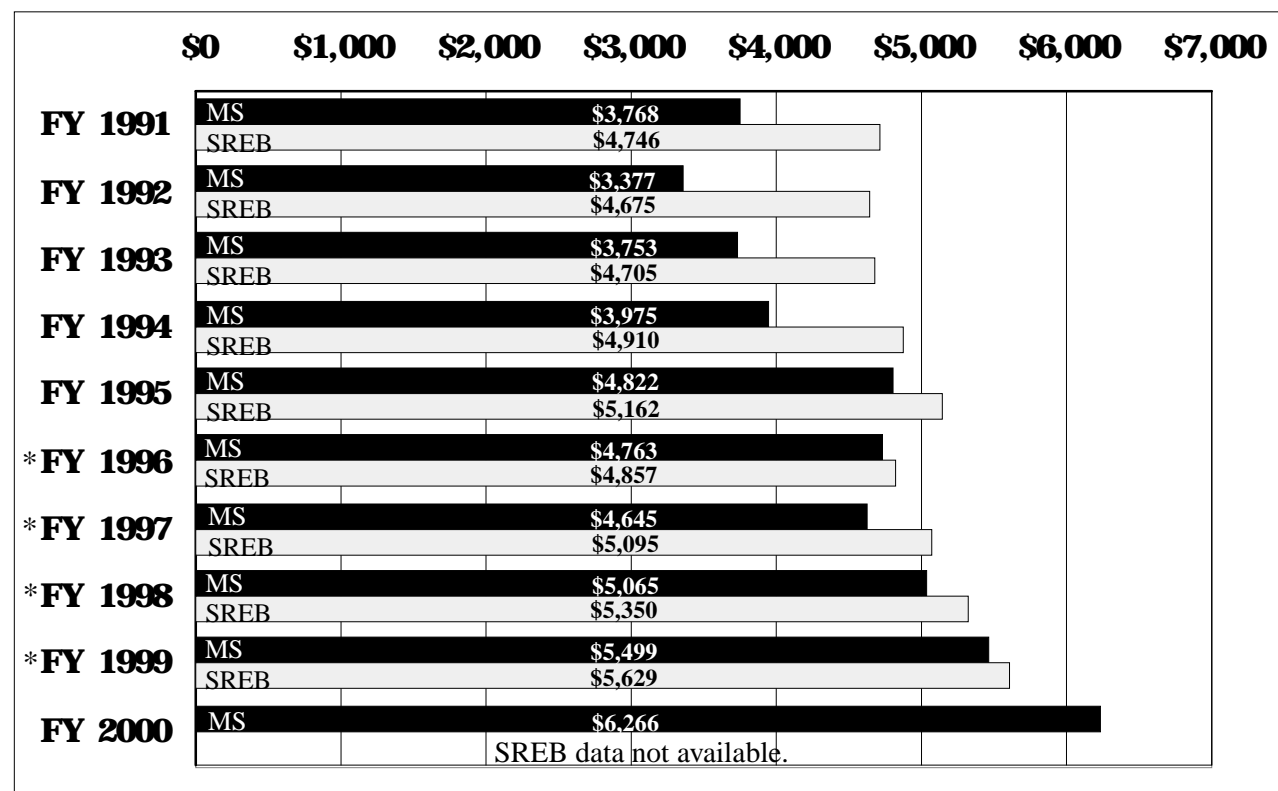

## MISSISSIPPI/SREB STATES AVERAGE APPROPRIATION PER FTE STUDENT (A TEN-YEAR COMPARISON)

- ❖ The average funding for a full-time equivalent student in Mississippi's public universities and in public universities in the SREB region is compared in the chart below. This funding represents not only support of instruction, but also availability of computers, library resources, and laboratory equipment.
- ❖ From FY 1991 through FY 1994, Mississippi's full-time equivalent students were funded **significantly below the regional average**.
- ❖ In FY 1996, the funding in Mississippi approached the regional average, but in FY 1997, the average appropriation per FTE student dropped in Mississippi while the average for the SREB states increased. Although the average appropriation per FTE student in Mississippi increased in FY 1998 and in FY 1999, **Mississippi still falls below the SREB average**.



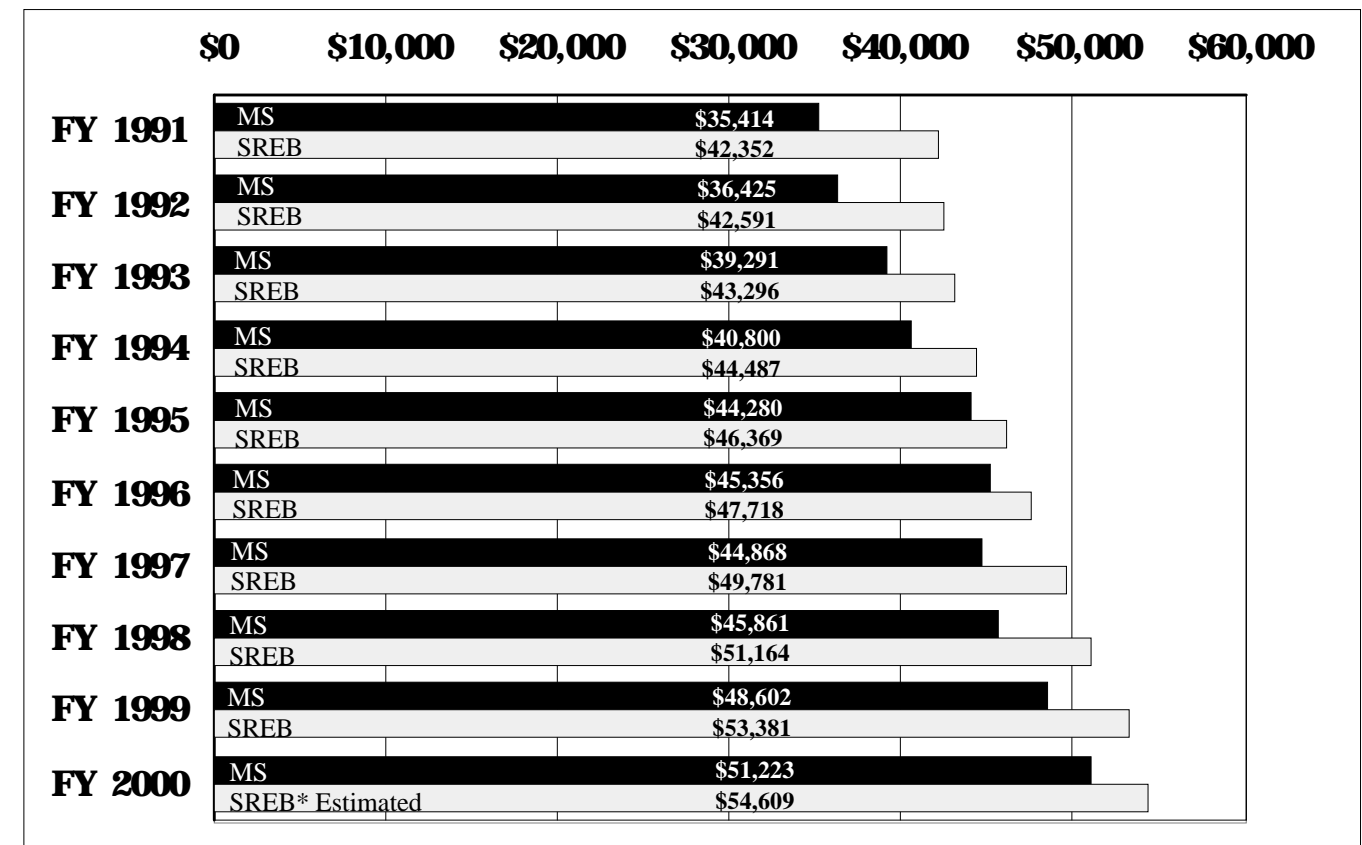

## MISSISSIPPI/SREB STATES AVERAGE FULL-TIME FACULTY SALARIES (A TEN-YEAR COMPARISON)

- ❖ A review of the average salaries for full-time faculty in Mississippi and in SREB states over the last ten years shows that **average full-time faculty salaries in Mississippi have remained below the regional average**.
- ❖ Mississippi's average salaries decreased in FY 1997 as the SREB average continued to go up. In FY 1998, Mississippi's average faculty salaries dropped to \$5,303 below the SREB average. In FY 1999, the average faculty salary improved but was still \$4,779 below the SREB average.
- ❖ In FY 1996, Mississippi's average faculty salaries were 95% of the SREB average. In FY 1997 and FY 1998, Mississippi's average faculty salaries fell to about 90% of the SREB average and were as much as \$5,303 below the SREB average. It is estimated that faculty salaries in FY 2000 will improve to about 94% of the SREB average.

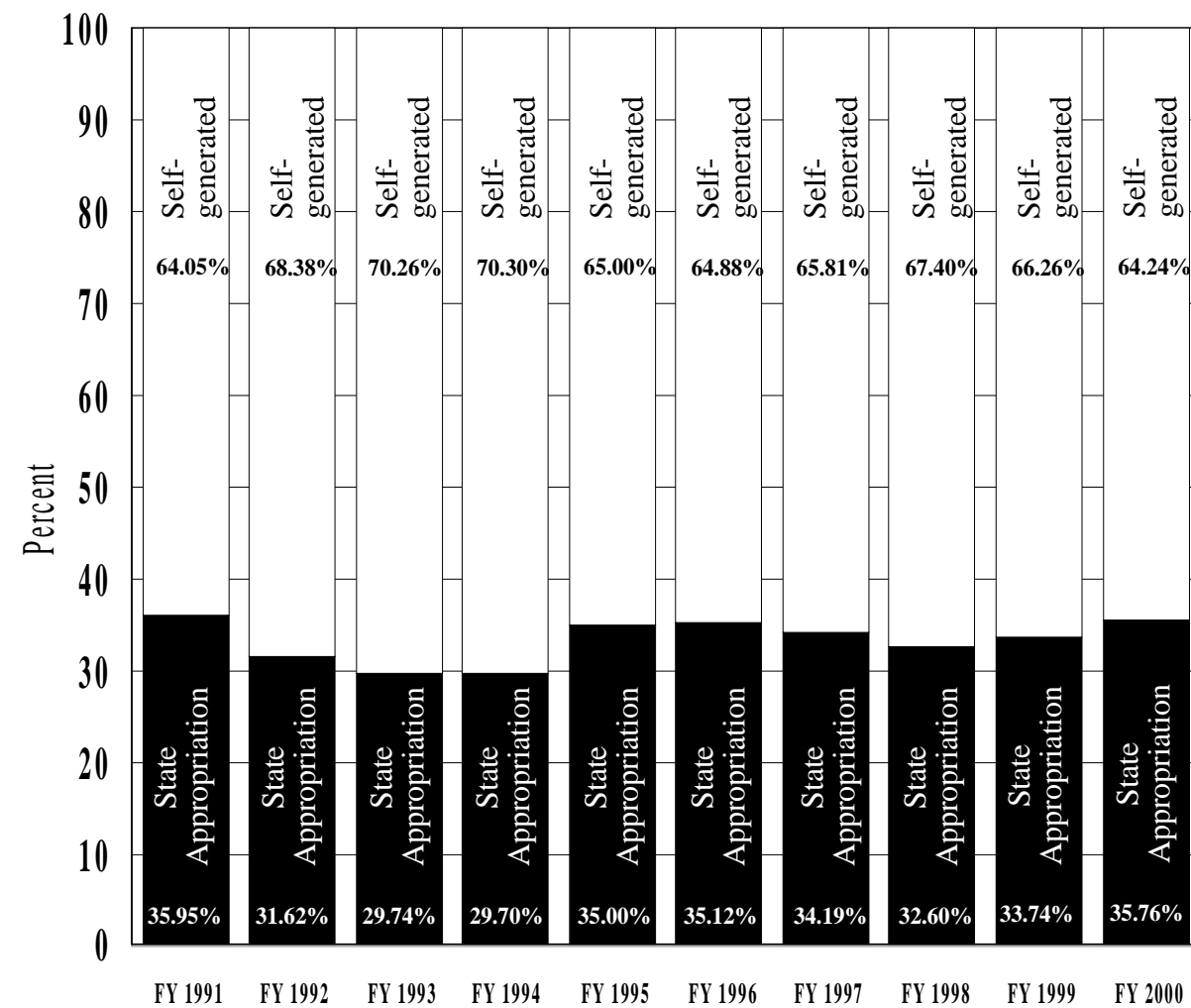

## PERCENTAGE OF TOTAL OPERATING BUDGET FUNDED BY STATE APPROPRIATIONS/SELF-GENERATED SOURCES (A TEN-YEAR COMPARISON)

- ❖ A review of the last ten years of funding for all of Mississippi's public universities shows that **state appropriations have provided funding ranging from 29.70% to 35.95% of the total operating budget for Mississippi universities.**
- ❖ The self-generated money for the operation of the universities has been generated by the students in the form of tuition and fees and by other sources.
- ❖ Although state appropriations have improved since FY 1994, they still have not reached the level attained in FY 1991.

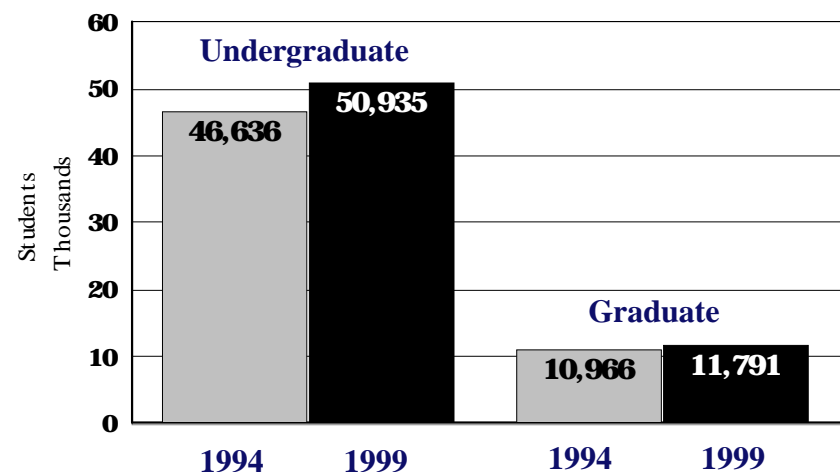
## TOTAL HEADCOUNT ENROLLMENT BY LEVEL FALL SESSION (A FIVE-YEAR COMPARISON)

### Undergraduate

- ❖ Total student enrollment in **undergraduate** programs at the eight universities from the Fall Session 1994 to the Fall Session 1999 **increased by 4,299, or 9.2%**.
- ❖ During the five-year period, undergraduate enrollment increased at six of the eight universities.

### Graduate

- ❖ Total student enrollment in **graduate** programs at the eight universities from the Fall Session 1994 to the Fall Session 1999 **increased by 825, or 7.5%**.
- ❖ During the five-year period, graduate enrollment increased at four of the eight universities and the Medical Center.

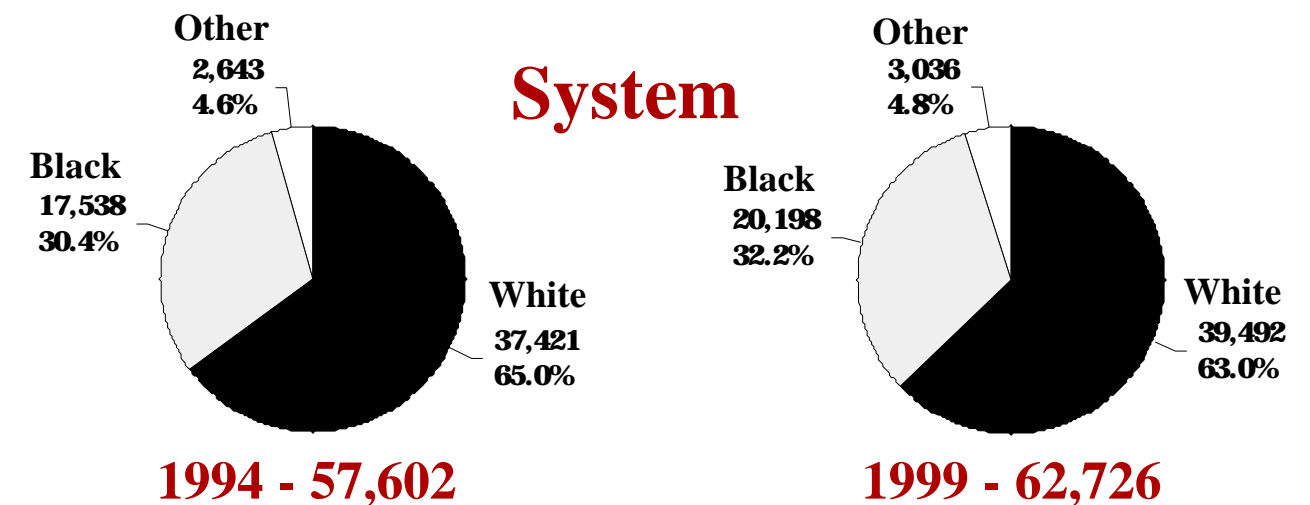

## TOTAL HEADCOUNT ENROLLMENT BY RACE FALL SESSION (A FIVE-YEAR COMPARISON)

- ❖ The total number of students enrolled in the eight universities **increased by 5,124, or 8.9%** from the Fall Session 1994 to the Fall Session 1999.
- ❖ Overall, **white** enrollment **increased by 5.5%**; **black** enrollment **increased by 15.2%**, and enrollment of **other** minority students **increased by 14.9%** over the five-year period.
- ❖ Black enrollment at the historically white institutions **increased with a total of 9,054**, an increase in the 1999 Fall Session of **30.6%** over that of the 1994 Fall Session.



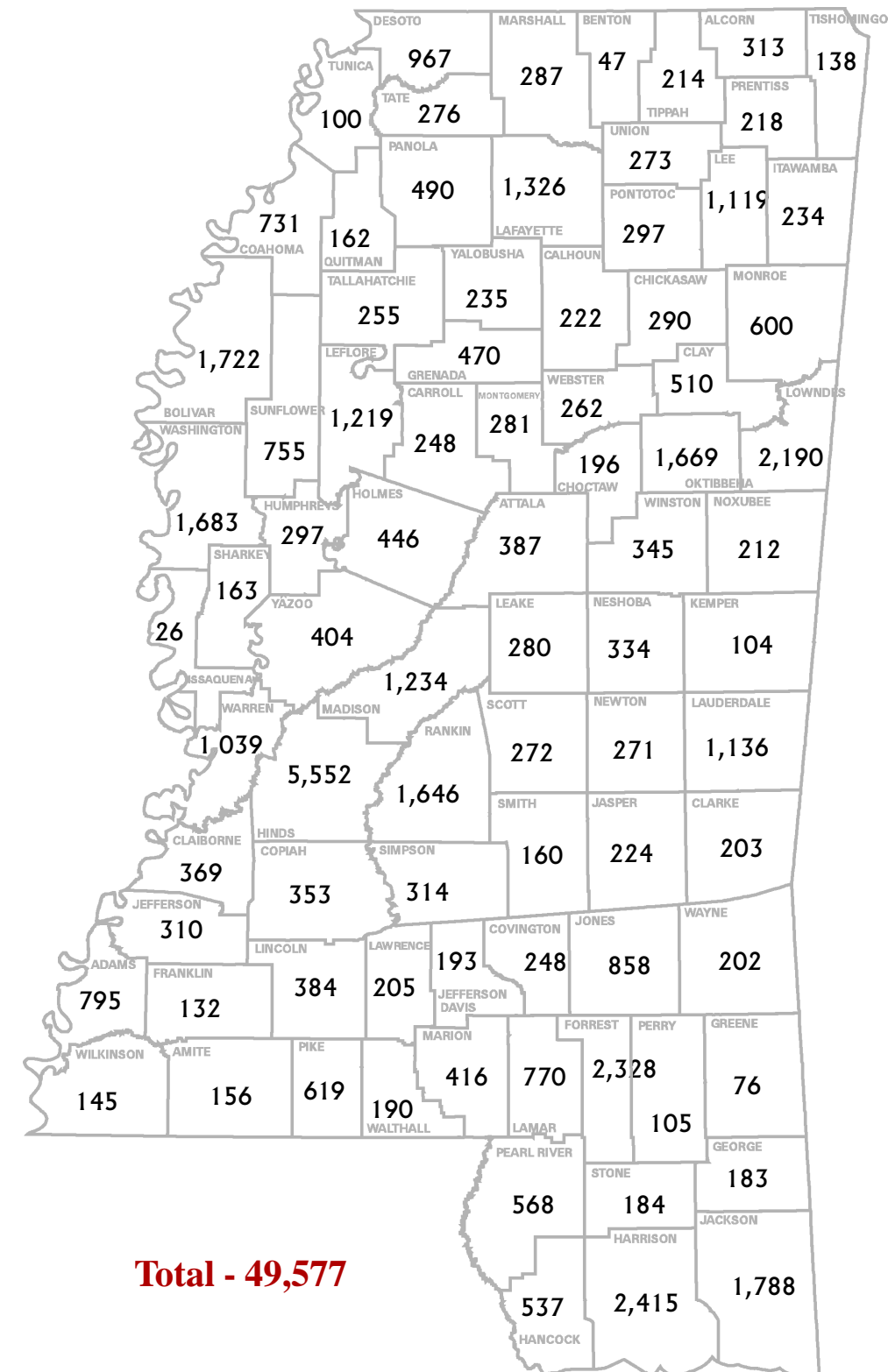

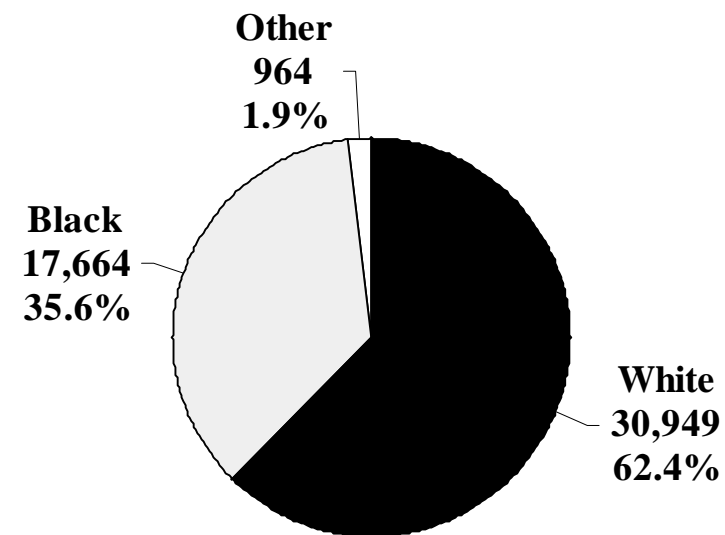

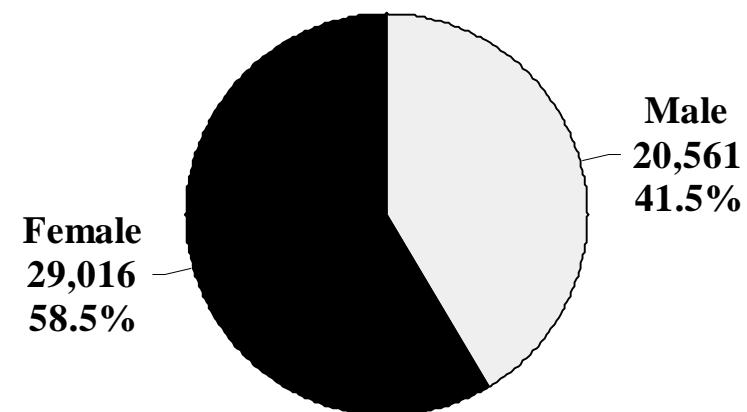

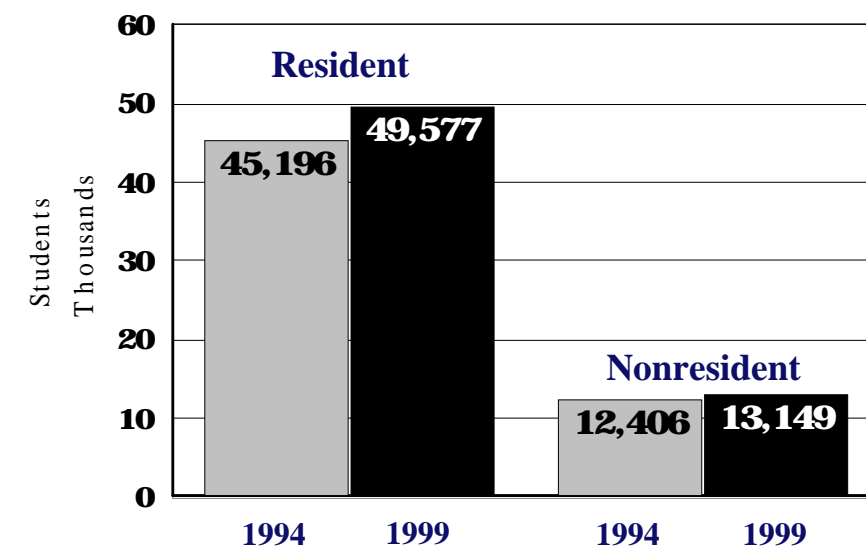
### Resident

- ❖ Of the **3,802** total transfer students reported, **37.3%** are enrolled at USM.

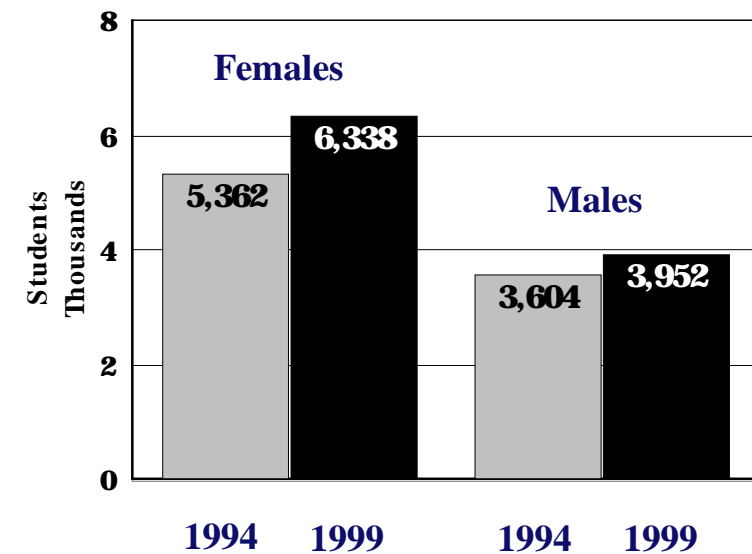

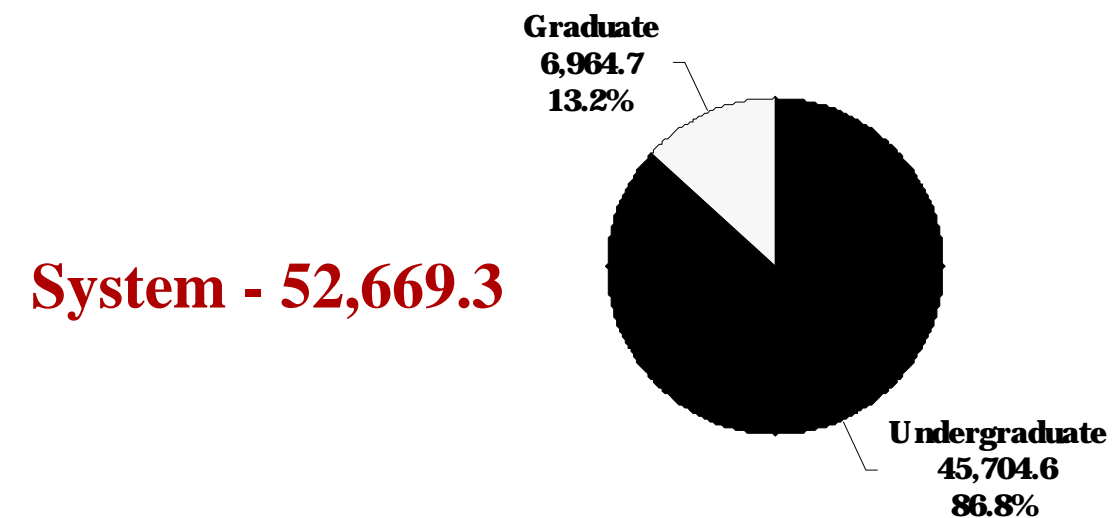

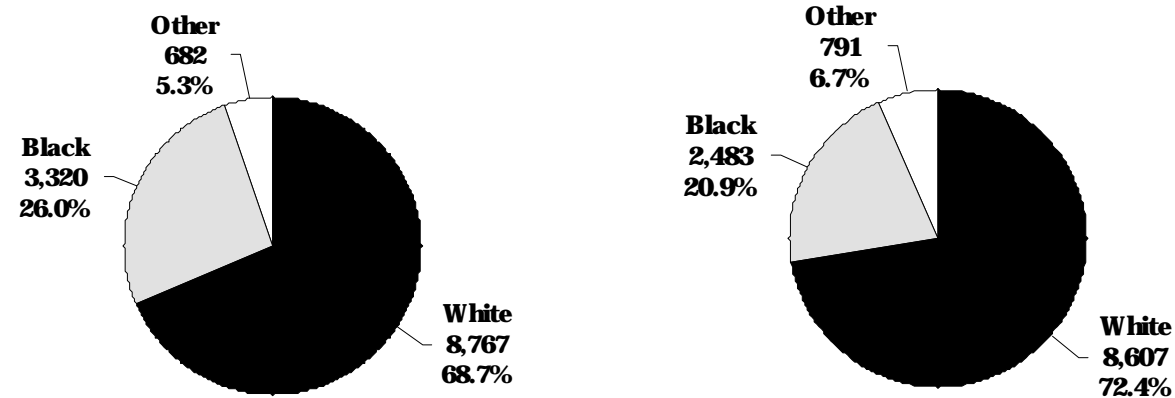

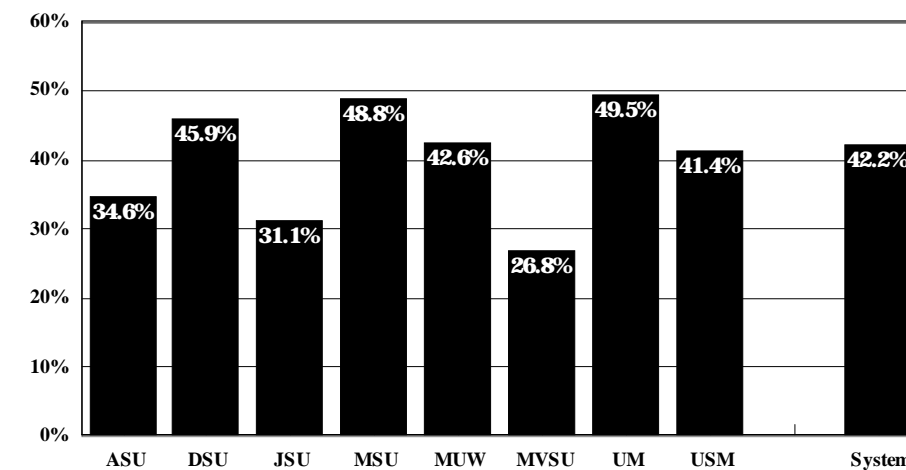

## GRADUATION RATES ENTERING FRESHMEN FALL 1985 THROUGH FALL 1993

- ❖ The entering Freshmen cohort for Fall Sessions 1985 through 1993 were each tracked for a six-year period to determine the rate of graduation for those students. (Six years is a standard period of time for graduation according to the U.S. Department of Education.)
- ❖ The bar graph shows the average graduation rate for the nine cohorts -- from Fall 1985 through Fall 1993 -- for each of the universities. The table shows each of the nine cohorts by university and system.
- ❖ Five of the eight universities had an average graduation rate above 40% for these nine cohorts, with a system average of 42.2%.

# STUDENT FINANCIAL AID

## SUSTAINED GROWTH IN STATE STUDENT FINANCIAL AID PROGRAMS

The State Student Financial Aid Programs have continued to experience sustained growth. The following tables demonstrate the growth in the number of students served and the amount expended in the state grant programs including **Mississippi Resident Tuition Assistance Grant (MTAG)**, the **Mississippi Eminent Scholars Grant (MESG)**, and the **Higher Education Legislative Plan for Needy Students (HELP)** and the loan/scholarship programs including the **Critical Needs Teacher Loan/Scholarship Program (CNTP)**, **William Winter Teacher Scholar Loan Program (WWTS)** and **Graduate Teacher Summer Loan/Scholarship Program (GTS)**. Public and institutional familiarity with the **MTAG, MESG, and HELP Programs**, continued efforts to promote teacher education as a career through participation in **CNTP and WWTS**, and an emphasis on **GTS** as a motivation for current teachers to upgrade baccalaureate degrees will enable the full potential of these student financial aid programs to be realized.

The table on page 49 presents an overview of all State Student Financial Aid Programs from FY 1996 through FY 1999. This overview demonstrates the impact of funding on program participation.

Authorized in March of 1995 by the Legislature, the **MTAG** and **MESG** Programs were available to Mississippi residents beginning FY 1996 under the following guidelines:

The **Mississippi Resident Tuition Assistance Grant (MTAG) Program** offers financial assistance to Mississippi residents who are Freshmen, Sophomores, Juniors, and Seniors attending any state institution of higher learning or public community or junior college located in Mississippi or any regionally accredited, state-approved, non-profit two- or four-year college or university in Mississippi. The Program is administered by the Mississippi Post-Secondary Education Financial Assistance Board. Awards are dependent upon availability of funds and are subject to proration. Under the **MTAG Program**, the maximum grant award for Freshmen and Sophomores is \$500 per regular academic year; the maximum grant for Juniors and Seniors is \$1,000 per regular academic year.

The **Mississippi Eminent Scholars Grant (MESG) Program** offers financial assistance to Mississippi residents who are first-time Freshmen or renewal recipients attending any state institution of higher learning or public community or junior college located in Mississippi or any regionally accredited, state-approved, non-profit two- or four-year college or university in Mississippi. The Program is administered by the Mississippi Post-Secondary Education Financial Assistance Board. Awards are dependent upon availability of funds and are subject to proration. Under the **MESG Program**, the maximum grant award is \$2,500 per regular academic year, not to exceed tuition and required fees.

Authorized in March of 1997 by the Legislature and amended in 1998 and 1999, the **HELP Program** was available to Mississippi residents beginning FY 1998 under the following guidelines:

The **Higher Education Legislative Plan for Needy Students (HELP)** provides full tuition to all qualified, college-bound Mississippi residents who apply and enroll full-time at any state public and non-profit two-year and four-year eligible college or university to pursue a first baccalaureate or first associate undergraduate degree. Eligible applicants must have a 2.5 high school grade point average, a composite score of 20 on the ACT, and must be able to document residency in Mississippi for two (2) years prior to applying. Additionally, the applicant's family must document that the two (2) year average annual adjusted gross income is less than \$36,500.

## SUSTAINED GROWTH IN STATE STUDENT FINANCIAL AID PROGRAMS (CONTINUED)

Other requirements are listed on the **HELP** application and must also be met. Eligible applicants must have received notification of federal student aid eligibility prior to the HELP application deadline. Funding is limited and awards are made on a first-come, first-served basis. Under the **HELP Program**, the maximum grant award for any recipient is tuition and required fees at an eligible state institution of higher learning or public community or junior college.

The table on page 50 details the actual **MTAG** and **MESG** awards for FY 1996 through estimated FY 2000. The table on page 50 shows the actual **HELP** Awards for FY 1998 and FY 1999 and estimated FY 2000.

Authorized in March of 1998 by the Legislature, the **CNTP Program** was available to Mississippi residents beginning FY 1999 under the following guidelines:

The **Critical Needs Teacher Loan/Scholarship Program (CNTP)** provides tuition, required fees, the average cost of room and meals, and a \$500.00 book allowance at the college or university in which the student is enrolled, not to exceed an amount equal to the total cost of tuition, room and meals, books and required fees assessed by a state approved public two-year or four-year institution of higher learning during that school year. An eligible student must be enrolled full-time or part-time (six hours) in a program of study leading to a Class "A" standard teacher educator license, must have a 2.5 high school grade point average and a composite score of 18 on the ACT. Students must sign a contract agreeing to teach one year for each year the award is received in an accredited public school or public school district in a critical teacher geographic shortage area of Mississippi as defined at the time of his/her graduation. Recipients receiving four annual awards who render service in an accredited public school or public school district in a critical teacher geographic shortage area in Mississippi need only teach three years. Program participation is limited to 4 years. Funds are limited and awards are made on a first-come, first-served basis. Recipients of the **CNTP** loan are not eligible for funds from other state aid programs. In the event the recipient fails to remain enrolled in a teacher education program of study or fails to fulfill the service obligation, repayment of principal and interest is required.

It should be noted that 72 percent of the funds awarded in the 18 loan/scholarship programs during FY 1999 was applied to the **Critical Needs Teacher Loan/Scholarship Program, William Winter Teacher Scholar Loan Program** and the **Graduate Teacher Summer Loan/Scholarship Program**.

The table on page 51 illustrates the growth in the **Critical Needs Teacher Loan/Scholarship Program, William Winter Teacher Scholar Loan Program** and the **Graduate Teacher Summer Loan/Scholarship Program** since FY 1996.

The table on page 52 presents an overview of **MTAG, MESG, HELP, CNTP, WWTS and GTS** recipients and expenditures by **Institution Type** for FY 1999.
